

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GREETINGS FROM MAP



MAP, situated on Kasturba Road, is a space for exhibitions and public programming held across five galleries, a learning centre, an auditorium, museum library, cafe and restaurant, and shop.

We are thrilled to share our comprehensive report detailing the activities and achievements of the Museum of Art & Photography (MAP) for the financial year 2023–24. Last year marked our first full year of being open as a physical museum. It was heartening to note that over 1,00,000 visitors entered our doors and got to experience the museum.

We hosted a diverse range of curated events, providing unique experiences to foster a deeper engagement with art and culture. These events have included workshops, walkthroughs, panel discussions, film screenings, focused youth engagements, and conferences held through the year.

We curated and showcased seven exhibitions, each offering a distinct perspective on art and inviting viewers to explore new narratives and interpretations. Our exhibition, *Book of Gold: The Kanchana Chitra Ramayana of Banaras*, presented nearly 80 folios of an 18th-century illustrated manuscript of the Ramcharitmanas, on public display for the first time ever.

Within one year, as a physical experiential space, MAP has found its place in the 'Top 20 Cultural Spots' list on National Geographic's 'Best of the World' 2024 annual list. MAP, along with three other museums worldwide, was also selected by Adobe for a prestigious partnership, underscoring our commitment to education in the arts.

We maintain a steadfast commitment to inclusion and accessibility, demonstrated by our ongoing initiatives such as special events, guided walkthroughs, and community sensitisation programmes. In July 2023, MAP hosted the inaugural edition of our annual conference, *Inclusion in Cultural Organisations*. This gathering convened experts from both the arts and the broader development sector to explore the intricacies of fostering inclusion within the arts.

The MAP Academy Encyclopedia of Art has expanded to now encompass about 3,000 articles and glossaries covering a wide array of subjects including modern and contemporary art, pre-modern art, architecture, photography, design, textiles, and living traditions. Through strategic partnerships with publishing platforms such as ThePrint, Deccan Herald, Dainik Jagran, Smarthistory, Garland Magazine, and Selvedge Magazine, many of these articles are disseminated to millions of readers globally, enriching the discourse on art and culture. Through its courses and programmes, including *Textiles from the Indian Subcontinent*, *Modern & Contemporary Indian Art*, and *A History of Indian Craft: 1850s to the Present*, it has built a community of over 8,000 learners.

As we reflect on our achievements, we extend our heartfelt appreciation to our dedicated team, board members, donors and partners for their invaluable contributions. Most importantly, we are grateful to our diverse audience, whose unwavering support and enthusiasm have fueled our journey thus far.

Looking ahead, we are excited to continue our mission of fostering creativity, dialogue, and inclusivity in the arts. Thank you for being a part of our journey, and believing in us.

Produced during a residency programme, the artworks of artist Indu Antony raised questions about identity, play, rest, the location of the self, and the space for emotions, trauma and joy. The exhibition showcased works jointly produced by Antony and women in Lingarajapuram and Namma Katte, evolving not just out of conversations that had been taking place for over two years, but that also reflected the artist’s mindspace and identity. The exhibition was a part of Mindscales, an international cultural programme organised by the Wellcome Trust, that aimed to support a transformation in how we understand, address and talk about mental health.



Curated by the late Kavita Singh and Parul Singh, this exhibition illuminated the enduring vitality of the Indian painting tradition well into the 19th century. Disputing conventional art historical narratives that suggest the decline of miniature painting in northern India during this period, the exhibition showcased the ambitious, illustrated manuscript commissioned for the royal court of Banaras.

For the first time on public display, this exhibition united nearly 80 pages from the manuscript, providing insight into the historical context of its creation and highlighting the diverse array of artists involved.

As part of the exhibition, the dispersed folios from the manuscript were virtually reconstructed as a flipbook. This comprises 1,048 pages and serves as a digital substitute for the original manuscript, which is no longer complete. Utilising photographs captured by the American Institute of Indian Studies (AIIS), which had permission to photograph the manuscript in the 1970s, this flipbook integrates documented images from the exhibition's featured folios. This initiative marks the first public release of the manuscript's contents.

The publication presented alongside this exhibition, featuring six essays by renowned scholars and detailed reproductions of the folios, serves as a valuable resource for scholars, enthusiasts, and even the general public interested in delving deeper.



Responding to a selection of photographs from the MAP collection, featuring 23 artworks by Alexander Gorlizki and the Pink City Studio, led by master miniature painter Riyaz Uddin, the exhibition challenges the limitations of traditional photography by transforming historic photographs of royalty, architecture, and nature into vibrant and whimsical narratives. Gorlizki's elaborate compositions breathe new life into the photographs, while Uddin and the artists from the Pink City Studio reproduce these new forms, colours, and patterns in immaculate detail. These artworks redefine traditional imagery, challenging historical rigidity and conventional perceptions, inviting viewers into a world of imagination and wonder.



ZOBOP

Zobop, a floor installation by Jim Lambie, consists of concentric lines of vibrant polychromatic vinyl that reframe the architectural landscape of the gallery at MAP. This series made its debut at Transmission Gallery, Glasgow, in 1999, marking the inception of a dynamic artistic journey. *Zobop* thrives on its ability to adapt to and energise each unique exhibition space it inhabits, breathing fresh vitality into the work with every new presentation. Inspired by the intricate progressions of jazz music, *Zobop* pays homage to the Bebop movement. The rhythmic patterns of the concentric lines respond to the existing architecture, inviting viewers to engage with the space on their own terms, whether through aesthetic appreciation or conceptual exploration.

NEK CHAND SCULPTURES

“I regarded myself neither as an artist nor as a craftsman. I myself was completely insignificant. I had no idea about anything, except for the fact that I was devoting my time to a task I was passionate about. I worked to the limits of my strength.”

Nek Chand Saini, a self-taught artist, is famous for his sculptures created from urban debris at the Rock Garden in Chandigarh. As a road inspector in Chandigarh, which was being redesigned in the 1950s, he gained access to and worked with materials such as cement, sand, gravel and more. Reminiscent of mosaics, these four foot tall human-like sculptures arose from discarded materials. Some carry in their hands an empty container, whereas others balance it on their heads, thereby giving a purpose to these found objects. Looking at the inherent wasteful nature which comes with development, these eight figures are an invitation to rethink the idea of a sculpture garden.

Throughout the year, MAP actively engaged with its audience through 324 curated events, catering to diverse interests and demographics. These encompassed workshops, guided tours, panel discussions, film screenings, interactive youth sessions, and conferences, providing enriching experiences. In December 2023, MAP participated in the city-wide Unboxing Bengaluru festival, a 10-day celebration showcasing the vibrant arts and culture scene of the city, featuring our annual festival, *Art is Life*, dedicated to the celebration of art, culture and discourse.

This year's theme was *Old Threads, New Stories*, wherein we welcomed artists, storytellers, and visitors to envision, reinterpret, and transform historical narratives. Through the medium of film, we collaborated with filmmakers Amit Dutta, Naveed Mulki and Sumantra Ghosal to construct new narratives and imagined encounters, as they responded to artworks and objects from the MAP collection. PUBLIC PROGRAMMES HIGHLIGHTS

- *Photographic Concepts and Design Tools*, a week-long photography workshop by Nicolaus Schmidt, organised in collaboration with the Goethe Institut
- Three workshops curated around the theme of *Thinking Cities*, each approaching the idea of mapping the city in different ways. Facilitated by researcher Veena Chaudhary, expressive arts therapist Aliyeh Rizvi and artist Sareena Khemka, each workshop took a unique angle to explore the idea of the city, place and space: through memory, locality, lived experience and artistic mark-making

PRIVATE EVENTS & WALKTHROUGHS

We have organised over 55 private events with over 2,500 visitors in attendance until March, 2024.

SELF-LED INITIATIVES

Through a series of self-led projects, collaborative efforts, and community-driven initiatives, we aim to foster dialogue and innovation, advancing both artistic and activist practices. This programme, centred around MAP's inaugural exhibition, *VISIBLE/ INVISIBLE: Representation of Women in Art through the MAP Collection*, welcomes participation from individuals of all genders, ages, and socio-cultural backgrounds. The purpose of the programme is to create situations and events that facilitate and broaden forms of coming and being together; the joys, the disagreements, the uncomfortable silences and more, within the Museum. Under Self Led Initiatives, we have hosted a variety of sessions – regular portfolio reviews for younger artists in the city, a workshop that looks at art as a medium to facilitate conversations around sexual abuse, and a queer tango social.

MUSEUMS WITHOUT BORDERS








SUMMER AT MAP

At MAP's yearly summer programme for young audiences, we explored the exciting world of S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics) through six hands-on workshops and learning experiences.

Each workshop was crafted to explore a different facet of science and history, and presented participants with the opportunity to learn and replicate different artistic and making techniques. Workshops explored origami, pottery, cyanotype printing, shibori tie & dye, stop motion animation and monoprinting, in which 73 children between the ages of 8 and 12 participated.

SCHOOLS AT MAP

Schools at MAP is dedicated to offering children a museum experience coupled with learning opportunities through tailored walkthroughs and workshops based around specific objects from our exhibitions. The engagement is highly interactive and aims to build upon students' prior experiences. This year, we welcomed over 1,200 students from more than 25 different schools.

JOURNEYS THROUGH ART

Journeys Through Art is a year-long programme centred on education through the arts, emphasising the development of skills such as creative thinking, critical analysis and communication. The programme concluded its first cycle in March 2023, with more than 190 children from four schools taking part. The second cycle commenced in June 2023, with the participation of 300 children from seven schools. This programme is supported by the State Street Foundation.

TEENS TAKEOVER

MAP welcomed four high school students to collaborate with various MAP team members.

Through the two-week programme, the participants shadowed team members from the Collections, Exhibitions, and Learning teams, gaining insights into their functions and roles. They also created an interactive zine and an audio guide for *With great ease: The photography of T.S. Satyan* that other visitors to the exhibition, in particular teenagers, could engage with.

ART SPARKS

Art Sparks is our video series designed for young learners, promoting the practice of thinking through the arts. The series is organised into seasons, each delving into selected content through diverse formats such as thinking routines, art games, and hands-on making demonstrations. This year, our team launched five seasons of *Art Sparks* (with 8 episodes each), centred around unique themes. Three of these featured or were co-created with children, including a special collaboration between MAP and Museum of Solutions (MuSo), Mumbai that explored eight historical objects from our collection, serving as inspiration for eight young participants to create objects for the future.

ART FOR THOUGHT

Art for Thought is a set of creative exercises in English and Kannada that bring together art and themes of mental health care, to gently aid explorations into the ways we relate to ourselves, our bodies and our surroundings. This project has been developed by MAP in collaboration with UnBox Cultural Futures Society, and may soon be a part of hospital waiting rooms.



EDUCATOR'S WORKSHOP & OPEN HOUSE

As part of Educators Capacity Development at MAP, a workshop was organised for 20 participants, in collaboration with IADEA. The session aimed to introduce participants to cultural contexts, enhancing and deepening their understanding of how art can be used in the classroom to build cultural sensitivity.

We also held an open house to introduce life skills trainers attached to the Dream A Dream Foundation to the Museum and the possible engagements that could be facilitated for the school groups they work with.

COMMUNITY BUILDING

MAP is dedicated to providing more opportunities and meaningful experiences for young people to interact with the Museum, and culture at large.

The youth collective currently consists of 220+ members on WhatsApp, and dedicated programming for this audience aims to provide a platform for individuals aged 18 to 25 to find, engage with, and learn more about the arts.

These programmes are diverse, incorporating reading sessions, film screenings, workshops, and skill-building sessions among others, including MAP's quarterly youth journal, Pulse. The journal serves as a platform that amplifies the voices of young adults—a

collaborative and autonomous space led by and for this vibrant demographic, to showcase their creative endeavours and expressions. Each volume of the journal centres on a specific theme and encompasses various forms of creative works. For the first volume, we explored the theme 'Work-in-Progress' and looked at the nuanced, multifaceted and often bittersweet experiences of growing up and navigating the changes that come with early adulthood. This contains written work, illustrations, video work and photography by 18-25 year olds who explored the idea of being a 'Work-in-Progress' in their own ways. We received a total of 39 applications from across the globe, out of which 13 entries were published.

INCLUSION IN CULTURAL ORGANISATIONS

MAP held the first iteration of its annual conference, *Inclusion in Cultural Organisations*, in July 2023. The first of its kind organised by a museum in India, this conference brought together experts from the arts, as well as from the broader development sector, to highlight and demystify the complexities of inclusion within the arts. The day-long conference featured conversations on the status of inclusion in cultural organisations, and representation within the workforce, fostering meaningful audience engagement, and the need for a strategic effort by funders to move towards a more inclusive art sector. During the conference, we launched a research study commissioned by MAP, in collaboration with the ReReeti Foundation. This study sheds light on the needs of individuals with disabilities in museum settings, emphasising the paramount importance of inclusivity and accessibility within these spaces.

INTERSECTIONS: ARTS, CULTURE & TECHNOLOGY

In collaboration with UNESCO, FICCI, Bangalore International Centre (BIC), Avid Learning, TeamWorks Art, and Art Links Learning, MAP hosted *The Bengaluru Cultural Tracker: Intersections: Arts and Culture*, a one day conference organised as part of the Culture Working Group under India's G20 Presidency. The conference looked to expand on the journey from analog to digital platforms, and on the use of digital technologies for the protection and preservation of cultural heritage. It brought together industry experts, policy makers and cultural practitioners who discussed key policy issues, challenges and solutions that drive the cultural sector.



INCLUSION & ACCESSIBILITY

Besides the *Inclusion in Cultural Organisations conference*, MAP also collaborated with Falana Films to produce a film highlighting all the accessible features available at the museum. This film serves as a comprehensive resource for visitors with diverse accessibility needs, offering detailed information on the facilities, services, and accommodations provided.

We organised seven inclusive walkthroughs of MAP exhibitions for groups with specific needs. Some of these were extended via our partner organisations including Mitra for Life, Diya Foundation, EKA School, Mitra Jyothi and Enable India.

To celebrate International Week of Deaf People 2023, from September 18th to September 24th, MAP organised a series of events celebrating the vibrant tapestry of deaf culture. These included enlightening talks, such as *Sign Language: History & Art*, captivating film screenings, engaging art workshops, and tailored walkthroughs catering to deaf children and the Karnataka Deaf Women Foundation.

To mark International Disability Day, artist Alexander Gorzki led a unique Indian Sign Language-interpreted walkthrough of the exhibition, *What The Camera Didn't See*. Over 20 deaf individuals participated in this immersive experience, engaging deeply with the artworks and interacting with the artists themselves.

Kamini Sawhney, was a distinguished panellist in a thought-provoking discussion organised by Mitra for Life on September 9th. The panel deliberated on 'The Role of Artists and Musicians in Cultivating an Inclusive Culture for the Neurodiverse.' Concurrently, our Inclusion team hosted a sensory experience featuring tactile artworks at an event held at the Bangalore International Centre (BIC), enriching the discourse on inclusivity.

ACCESSIBILITY FEATURES IN EXHIBITIONS

Recognising the importance of ensuring art appreciation for all visitors, MAP is working on creating Indian Sign Language (ISL) videos contextualising the artworks displayed on the 4th floor gallery. These videos will provide deaf and hard of hearing visitors with insights into the artworks, facilitating their engagement with the artistic narratives and contexts.


Continuing our commitment to accessibility, MAP has developed an audio guide for *Book of Gold: The Kanchana Chitra Ramayana of Banaras*. This innovative audio guide aims to provide an immersive experience for visitors, offering rich insights into the captivating narrative depicted within the exhibition.

The *Outside In: Meera Mukherjee and Jaidev Baghel* exhibition showcases the craftsmanship of Bastar Dhokra through a tactile model of an elephant, wax threads and clay complemented by an infographic illustrating various stages of the process. To ensure accessibility, the exhibition's content is translated into ISL, with videos available on the digital platform featured on Bloomberg Connects app.

MAP has collaborated with Yunikee Accessibility Services for Deaf Private Limited to produce Indian Sign Language translation videos for the exhibition's content. This partnership enhances accessibility, ensuring that individuals who use sign language can fully engage with and appreciate the exhibition's offerings.

COMMUNITY BUILDING

MAP was represented on multiple occasions throughout the year at events such as Purple Fest in Goa and the Dhvani conference organised by Solidarity Foundation in Bangalore.

MAP participated in the 3rd edition of the LGBT Pride Summit held in Mumbai in June. This summit provided invaluable insights into various planning processes, and integrating individuals from the LGBT community into the workplace.

BUILDING ACCESSIBILITY

We procured evacuation chairs to safely evacuate individuals with mobility challenges in case of an emergency, to ensure the safety and well-being of all visitors.

A baby changing table has been successfully installed at the all-genders washroom located on the first floor. This initiative aims to enhance convenience and accessibility for parents and caregivers visiting the museum with young children.

During the year, the team worked on conserving and restoring over 297 objects which included oil paintings, works on paper, textiles, stone, jewellery and photographs. Many of these formed part of the various exhibitions at MAP through the year.

We also organised a month-long photography workshop on Photo Collection Management as part of the MAP-Tata Trusts Art Conservation Initiative. This workshop was helmed by Anupam Sah, a senior art conservator.

The team covered 16 field surveys, including ARCE, Bihar Museum, Lucknow State Museum, SITRA Library, Isha Foundation, Madras High Court, Nagaraj Rao Collection, Lamp Museum, Canara Museum and a few more. Various in-house training sessions were also conducted for the team, throughout the year.



MAP had a 6 month digital residency with the Horniman Museum and Gardens, UK, under curator Zelda Cheate. Our artist in residence, Adira Thekkuveetil created a project titled Nimbus, in response to Cumulus, the Museum's online collection viewing system. Nimbus enriches and contextualises the Museum's collection of photographs by drawing connections with other objects and artefacts at MAP. This project can be viewed on our website.

In addition to Nimbus, Adira designed a digital exhibition displayed in the Sasken Multimedia gallery. Titled *The Museum is a Muse*, it explores ideas and experiences of a museum visitor within an exhibition space.

MAP is also thrilled to be selected to be part of the Adobe x Museums initiative, spearheaded by the Adobe Foundation. This initiative fosters collaborations with esteemed art institutions worldwide to advance Adobe's commitment to Creativity for All, while providing opportunities for under-represented creators to share their narratives on a global scale. Partner museums leverage their resources and platforms to enhance arts education and amplify the visibility of diverse creators through innovative programming.

With a goal to engage over 10 million students globally within a five-year timeframe (commencing in 2024), Adobe x Museums endeavours to empower creators of all backgrounds. Joining MAP in this endeavour are renowned institutions such as the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in the USA, The Victoria & Albert Museum (V&A) in the UK, and the Museum of Image and Sound (MIS) in Brazil.



MATCHBOX MOMENTOS



Developed in collaboration with Google Arts & Culture and Tasveer Ghar, this is an interactive artwork that is inspired by the collection of Gautam Hemmady (gifted to MAP), one of India's most renowned collectors of matchbox art and created by artist Harshit Agarwal. *Matchbox Momentos* introduces a fun approach to engaging with this archive, providing a distinctive glimpse into India's bygone everyday life – encompassing themes from industrialisation and musical instruments, to cinema, wildlife, and flora. Inspired by the traditional Indian board game Moksha Patam (also known as Snakes & Ladders), *Matchbox Momentos* reveals captivating narratives about matchbox art and its cultural significance in India.

INHERITANCE


This exhibition was the outcome of an international collaboration between MAP, Kanike, Glasgow Life Museums, and Street Level Photoworks as part of the British Council's 'Our Shared Cultural Heritage' (OSCH) programme, delving into the intersecting histories, memories, and identities that bind South Asia and the UK. By documenting personal, familial, and collective narratives, the exhibition invited viewers to take a visual journey, prompting reflection on the diverse legacies we inherit – from culturally rich traditions to socially divisive realities.

This year, MAP initiated the digitisation of 50 tangible and intangible heritage locations around India, out of which 40 locations are ready for testing as 3D Holographic experiences. These include locations like, Mysore Palace, Golden Temple, Amritsar, The Residency Lucknow, Tripura, Varanasi and the intangible heritage documentation of Theyyam in Kerala, the Chettinad Festival in Tamil Nadu and others. These experiences will be available at MAP's digital experience centre for our audiences. This grant is supported by Bank of America.

The Museum has digitised approximately 10,000 artworks from our extensive collection of over 60,000 pieces, all accessible on our website.

Harnessing holographic technology, artworks are brought to life in a three-dimensional, interactive, and educational manner. MAP employs this to craft lifelike and immersive experiences, seamlessly blending art forms with technology. This innovative approach enables visitors to explore artworks with stunning realism and intricate details.

Immersive paintings merge the visual elements of traditional artworks with modern technology, offering the viewers captivating and interactive experiences, by bringing paintings to life, infusing them with movement and narrative elements, and inviting viewers to virtually step into the artworks.

The MAP 'Pattern Search AI' feature presents an AI-based search tool enabling visitors to explore MAP's collection by sketching various shapes and patterns. Through advanced algorithms, the AI analyses the drawn patterns and presents images of artworks from MAP's collection.

The Sasken Multimedia Gallery offers an interactive experience where visitors can explore a range of pre-programmed digital exhibitions with just the click of a button. Guests can easily browse through exhibitions, including ones they may have missed previously, at their convenience. During the year, we have displayed about 29 experiences/ stories in this gallery. 
The MAP Academy is an open-access online platform that launched in 2022 as an educational project, working parallel to MAP. It focuses on increasing the visibility of South Asian art histories by writing and publishing critically-researched, reliable and jargon-free materials – including Online Courses, an Encyclopedia of Art and more. It aims to make art histories more accessible, based on the idea that doing so can have a positive social impact through broadening perspectives on humanity, heritage and culture.

Between 2023–24, the MAP Academy developed and launched new projects, grew and improved existing resources, conducted rigorous web-redesign, explored digital marketing strategies and strengthened its online presence. Through such endeavours as well as its partnerships and collaborations, it has widened its reach and potential for impact. All of this has been made possible through the generous support of the Rural India Support Trust (RIST) and the Infosys Foundation.


NEW COURSES & COMMUNITY BUILDING

Over the past year, the MAP Academy launched its short course, [Modern & Contemporary Indian Art](#) authored by Dr Beth Citron, and developed in partnership with Terrain.art. This was well received by diverse audiences, including artists represented in the course. Along with the inaugural course, *Textiles from the Indian Subcontinent*, the project's courses have over 5,400 learners enrolled.

Additionally, the team also organised its first online lecture series, *A History of Indian Craft: 1850s to the Present*, in collaboration with the Art, Resources and Teaching Trust (A.R.T.), and delivered by Dr Annapurna Garimella. This saw over 3,500 individuals sign up from around the world, and the MAP Academy has also made all of the lecture recordings, along with reading materials and interactive quizzes accessible on its platform as a short course. Through live events with Puja Vaish (Director, Jehangir Nicholson Art Foundation) and Pankaja Sethi (Textile Researcher and Designer), the team has also built a loyal and engaged audience.

In addition to maintaining direct communication with the community via emails, newsletters and discussion forums, the MAP Academy has increased its social media presence, created digital ads on Meta, Google and news platforms, and worked on Search Engine Optimisation (SEO).



RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

This year, the team has been conducting research towards short courses on architecture and photography. Additionally, the MAP Academy Encyclopedia of Art (MAEA) has grown to include over 3,000 articles, glossaries and clusters on a wide range of subjects, with a particular focus this year on Pre-Modern Art and Architecture, Modern and Contemporary Art, and Living Traditions from regions in South Asia that are beyond India. The team has also written stories highlighting varied themes and perspectives, and contributed special essays to publications including Photoworks, TAKE on Art, Vistara Magazine, Garland Magazine and more. The MAP Academy also completed research and development for its Timeline of Art, scheduled to launch in the coming year as a major knowledge resource that presents chronologies dating back thousands of years. This encourages audiences to build connections between historical moments and artistic developments across South Asia.

In addition to research and editorial work, and developing the Timeline, the team has redesigned its website, developed a landing page for the Encyclopedia with a special search functionality and interactive filters, and has also been working on improving article designs and formats to facilitate smoother journeys and engagements.

Within one year as a physical experiential space, MAP has found its place in the 'Top 20 Cultural Spots' list on National Geographic's 'Best of the World' 2024 annual list.

This list is put together by National Geographic's global community of editors, writers, photographers, and explorers who share their picks for the top museums, festivals, and other cultural spots and experiences worth a trip this year.





NEW GRANTS FOR THIS YEAR

Adobe India supported capital infrastructure as well as the expansion of the MAP collection and preparation towards the *Museum in a Box* programme.

Amazon India supported the development of Art Insight programme and contributed towards the redesigning of Art for Thought toolkits for younger audiences.

HT Parekh Foundation funded the exhibition *Hello & Goodbye: Postcards from the Early Twentieth Century* inspired by MAP's postcard collection. This grant enabled the creation of the tech-based experience through a dedicated app for the exhibition, which opened in April 2024 (after the period under review).
